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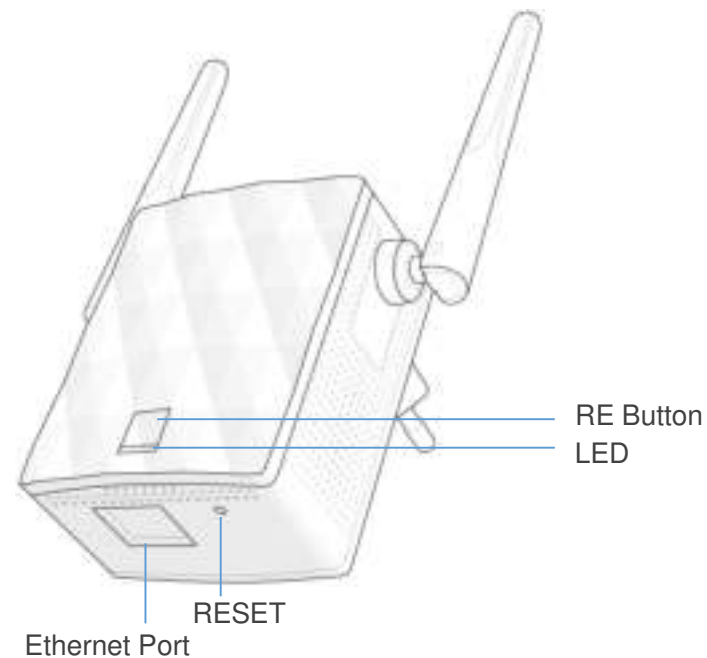

LED Explanation

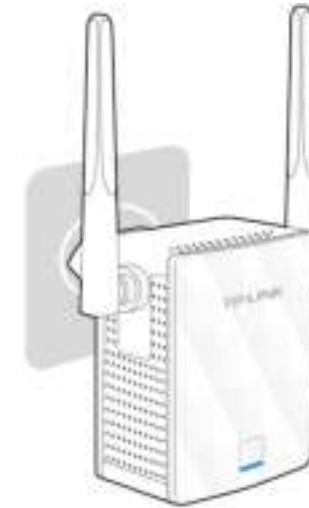
| Status | Color | Indication |
|----------|--------|---|
| On | Green | The extender is connected to the router, and is in a good location. |
| | Orange | The extender is connected to the router, but is too far away from the router. |
| | Red | No active connection. |
| Blinking | Green | WPS connection is in progress, or the extender is initializing. |
| Off | -- | The extender is powered off. |

Button and Port Explanation

- ◆  **(Range Extender/WPS) Button:** If your Wireless router supports WPS function, you can press the WPS button and then press the RE button of the extender to establish a secure connection between the wireless router and the extender.
- ◆ **RESET:** This button is used to restore the extender's factory default settings. There are two ways to reset the extender:
 - Option One:** While the extender is powered on, use a pin to press the RESET button, and the LED should turn off momentarily. Release the button and wait the extender to reboot to its factory default settings.
 - Option Two:** Log in to the extender's web management page, and go to **Settings > System Tools > Backup & Restore** page, click **Factory Restore**.
- ◆ **Ethernet Port:** One 10/100Mbps RJ45 Ethernet port is used to connect an Ethernet-enabled device to a Wi-Fi network, such as Internet TV, DVR, Gaming console and so on. Please note that this port cannot be connected to a router.

Position the Extender

For safety, we suggest you plug the extender right way up as the picture shows below.

Before You Begin

Please read this chapter carefully before using the device. The operating distance range of your wireless connection can vary significantly depending on the physical position of the wireless devices. Factors that can weaken signals by getting in the way of your network's radio waves are metal appliances or obstructions and walls. Typical ranges vary based on the types of materials and background RF (radio frequency) noise in your home or office.

In order to optimize the performance of the extender, please follow the instructions below to achieve an **ideal location** (please make sure it is always within the wireless coverage of the wireless router).

- **The Best Way is Halfway** - Generally, the ideal location for the extender is half-way between the wireless router and Wi-Fi dead zone. If the wireless signal is not satisfactory, you may place the extender somewhat nearer to the wireless router.



- **Less Obstacles Ensure Better Performance** - Clear obstacles in the way between the extender and the wireless router. It's better to locate it in a spacious place.
- **Less Interference Provides More Stability** - Choose a location away from Bluetooth devices and other household electronics, such as cordless phone, microwave, and baby monitor, etc., to minimize signal interference.



Basic Requirements



- ◆ Place your extender in a well-ventilated place far from direct sunlight, any heater or heating vent.
- ◆ Leave at least 2 inches (5cm) space around the device for heat dissipation.
- ◆ Unplug your extender in a lightning storm to avoid damage.
- ◆ Use appropriate web browser, such as Microsoft Internet Explorer 5.0 or above, Netscape Navigator 6.0 or above.
- ◆ Operating temperature of the extender should be 0°C~40°C (32°F~104°F).
- ◆ Operating humidity of the extender should be 10%~90%RH (Non-condensing).

Quick Setup

Option One: Using WPS (Wi-Fi Protected Setup)



WPS is an easier way to extend your host network. We recommend you to use this way if your host router has a WPS button. The

button might look like one of these: , , . Otherwise, please use [Option Two: Using Web Browser](#).

1 Power On


Plug in next to your router.

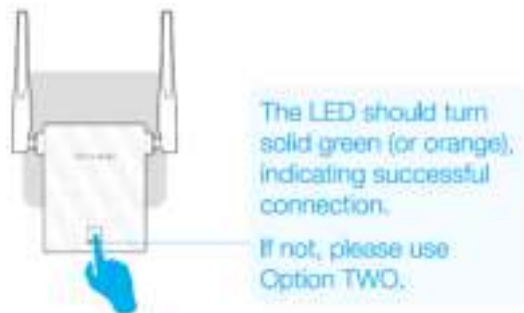


2 Connect

1) Press the **WPS button** on your router.



2) Immediately press the  button on your extender. The LED starts blinking.



- If the LED does not turn solid green (or orange), please use Option Two: Using Web Browser.
- Some ISP gateways disable the WPS function by default, if the WPS method fails, please use Option Two: Using Web Browser.

3 Relocate

- 1) Plug the extender into an electrical outlet about halfway between your router (Host Network) and the Wi-Fi dead zone.
- 2) Wait about 1 minute until the LED is **lit with a solid green**. If not, **relocate it closer to the router** to achieve better signal quality.



Enjoy!

The extender adds `_EXT` to the end of the host network's SSID and has the same Wi-Fi password.



Option Two: Using Web Browser

1 Power On

Plug in next to your router.



2 Connect to the Extender

- 1) Disconnect the Ethernet (wired) connection to your computer.
- 2) Click the Wi-Fi icon on the taskbar and connect to the extender's network **TP-LINK_WA855RE**.



→ For Mac OS X Users

- 1) Unplug the Ethernet cable from your Mac (if any).
- 2) Click the Wi-Fi icon in the top right corner of the screen and connect to the extender's network **TP-LINK_WA855RE**.



- Via Ethernet Cable

- 1) Disable the Wi-Fi on your computer.
- 2) Connect your computer to the extender via an Ethernet cable.



3 Configure

- 1) Launch a web browser on your computer and type **http://tplinkrepeater.net** in the address field. Enter **admin** (all lowercase) for both username and password and click **Login**.

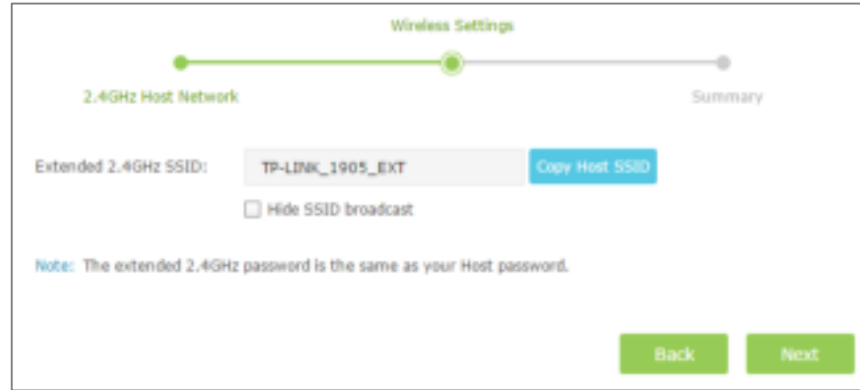

- 4) Either keep the default SSID or customize it for the extended 2.4GHz network, then click **Next**.



- 5) Verify your wireless settings and click **Save**. The LED should turn solid green (or orange), indicating successful connection.

4 Relocate

- 1) Plug the extender into an electrical outlet about halfway between your router (Host Network) and the Wi-Fi dead zone.
- 2) Wait about 1 minute until the LED is **lit with a solid green**. If not, **relocate the extender closer to the router** to achieve better signal quality.



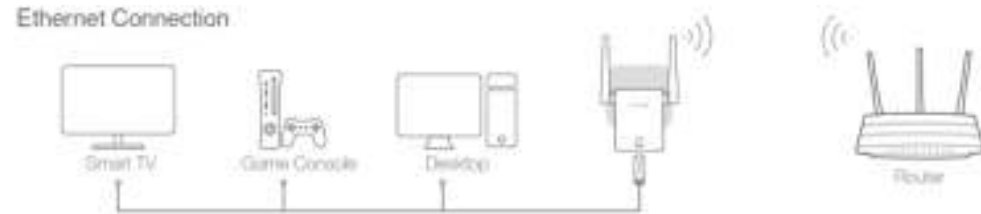

Unless you customized the extended network name during the configuration, the extender adds **_EXT** to the end of the host network's SSID and has the same Wi-Fi password.

Use the Extender as a Network Adapter

The extender can be used as a wireless adapter to connect any Ethernet-enabled device, such as a Blu-ray player, game console, DVR, or smart TV, to your wireless network.

After the extender connected to the Internet, you can connect an Ethernet-only device to the extender using an Ethernet cable.



Use the Extender as an AP

The extender can be used as an access point, thus to transform your existing wired network to a wireless network.

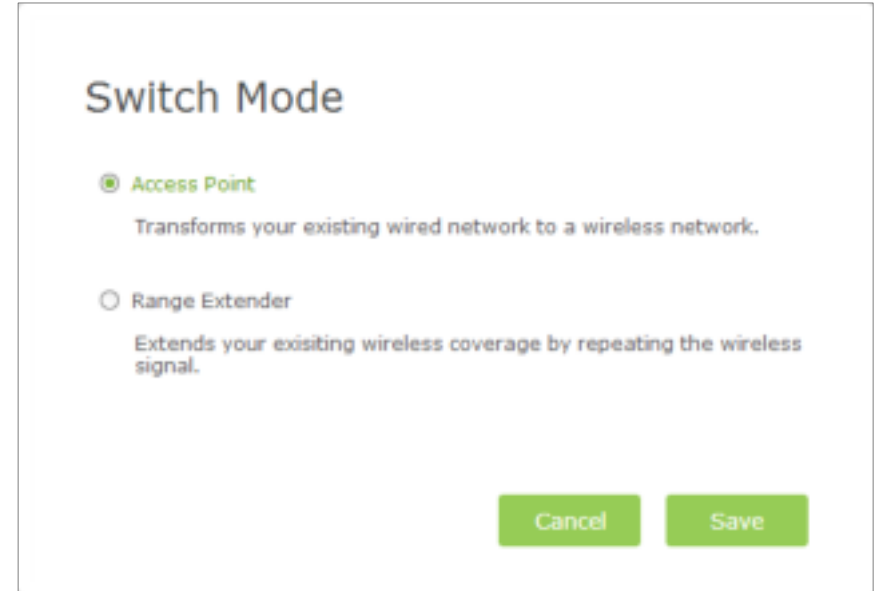
Set the extender as an AP

1 Connect the extender to your router

Power on the extender, and connect it to your router's Ethernet port with an Ethernet cable.

2 Set the extender to AP mode

- 1) Connect your computer to your extender's wireless network.
- 2) Launch a web browser and log into <http://tplinkrepeater.net>, click **Mode** in the top right corner, select **Access Point** and click **Save**. The extender will switch to AP mode and reboot automatically.



- 3) After rebooting, you may need to reconnect to the extender's network and log in again.

3 Change the SSID and Password (Optional)

Go to **Settings > Wireless > Wireless Settings** page, configure the extender as the picture shows below, and click **Save**.

- ◆ **Network Name (SSID):** Set a SSID for your AP's wireless network.
- ◆ **Security:** Select the security type. **WPA/WPA2 - Personal** is recommended.

If **WPA/WPA2 – Personal** is selected,

- 1) Select the security version. WPA2-PSK is recommended.
- 2) Select the encryption type. TKIP is NOT recommended if the

extender operates in 802.11n mode, because TKIP is not supported by 802.11n specification and the WPS function.

- 3) Enter a new password in the **Password** field.

If **WEP** is selected,

- 1) Select the security type. The default is auto, which automatically chooses Open System or Shared Key based on the capability and access request of the wireless client.
- 2) Select the WEP key format. ASCII format is a combination of alphabetic and numeric characters. Hexadecimal format is a combination of the numbers (0-9) and letters (A-F, a-f).
- 3) Select the key type. 64-bit allows you to enter 10 hexadecimal digits or 5 ASCII characters into the **Key Value** field. 128-bit allows you to enter 26 hexadecimal digits or 13 ASCII characters into the **Key Value** field.
- 4) Enter the WEP key into the **Key Value** field.

- ◆ **Mode:** Select a transmission mixed mode.
- ◆ **Channel Width:** Select a channel bandwidth for the wireless network.

- ◆ **Channel:** Select the operating channel for the wireless network. It is recommended to leave the channel to Auto, if you are not experiencing the intermittent wireless connection issue.

4 Enjoy the Internet

Now you can connect to the AP's wireless network to enjoy the Internet.

Connect your devices to the AP by WPS

There are three ways to connect your devices to the AP by WPS.

◆ Method ONE: Use your device's WPS button

- 1) Launch a web browser, log into <http://tplinkrepeater.net>, and then go to **Settings > Wireless > WPS** page.
- 2) Enable the WPS function of the AP.

- 5) "Connect successfully" will appear on the WPS page, which means that your client device has connected to the AP by WPS.

◆ Method TWO: Enter the client's PIN code on the AP

Use this method if your client device has a WPS PIN code.

- 1) Launch a web browser, log into <http://tplinkrepeater.net>, and then go to **Settings > Wireless > WPS** page.
- 2) Enable the WPS function of the AP.

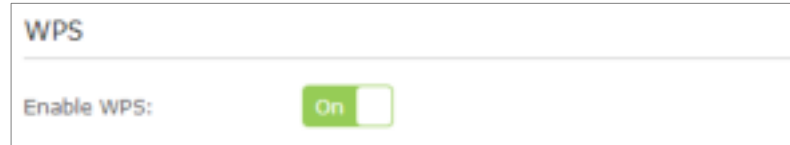

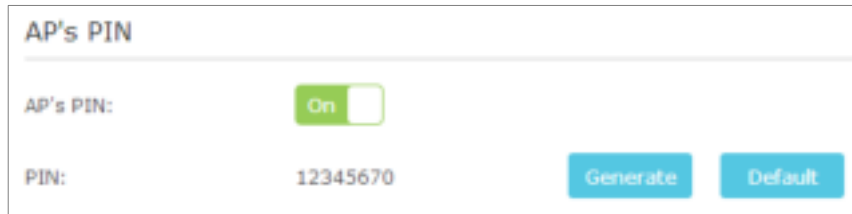
◆ Method THREE: Enter the AP’s PIN code on your client device

Use this method if your client device requires the AP’s PIN code.

- 1) Launch a web browser, log into <http://tplinkrepeater.net>, and then go to **Settings > Wireless > WPS** page.
- 2) Enable the WPS function of the AP.



- 3) Enable the AP’s PIN. The current PIN code of the AP is displayed here, you can click **Generate** to get a new one.



- 4) On your client device, enter the AP’s PIN code. When the AP’s LED is solid on, the client device has successfully connected to the AP.

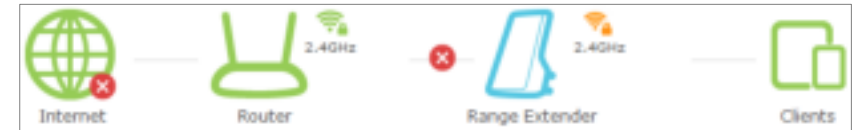
Current Status of the Extender

- 1) Launch a web browser, log into <http://tplinkrepeater.net>, and then go to **Settings > Status** page.
- 2) You can view the network connection status in this page.

- The normal status.



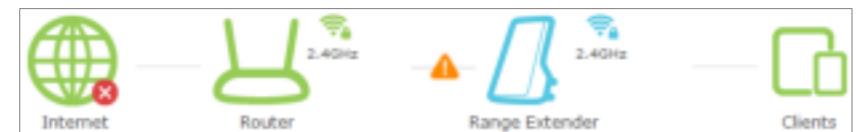
- The extender is failed to connect to the wireless network of your router.



- The extender is connected to your router, but no transmitting data. Please check your host network.



- The extender is connected to the router unnormally. Maybe the gateway is set incorrectly in the Static IP. You can select “Obtain an IP address automatically” on the “**Settings > Network**” page.



- The extender is failed to connect to the NTP server, or failed to obtain the DNS server address. Please check your host network.

Extend Another Network

If you want to extend another network, you can refer to the following steps to finish it quickly.

1. Launch a web browser, log into <http://tplinkrepeater.net>, and then go to **Settings > Wireless > Connect to Network** page.
2. Enable **Connect to 2.4GHz Network**. Then click **Wireless Scanner** to scan the wireless network you want to extend.

If the network you want to extend is on but not shown in the list, please try the steps below.

- Move the extender closer to your router. Then click **Refresh** on the top-right corner of the list to scan the network again.
- You can also enter the SSID and password of the network you want to extend on the **Connect to Network** page. Then click **Save** to connect to the host network.

4. Once a network is selected, the SSID and security settings of that network will automatically be filled in. If the host network is encrypted, enter the password and click **Save**.

5. Relocate

Plug in the extender halfway between your wireless router (Host Network) and the Wi-Fi dead zone.

Wait about 1 minute until the LED is **lit with a solid green**. If not, **relocate the extender closer to the router** to achieve better signal quality.

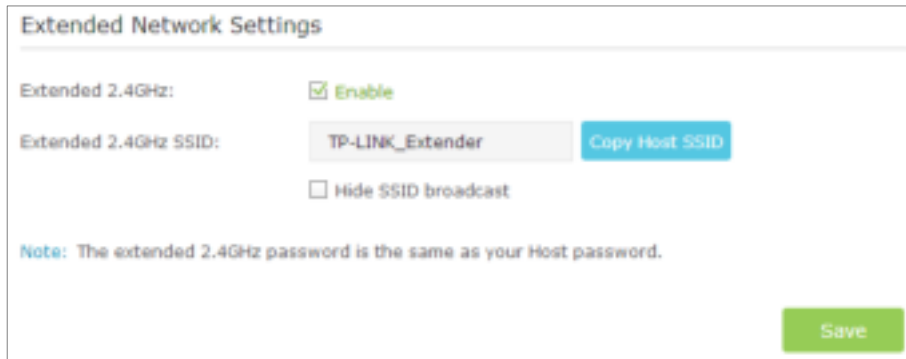

Customize the Extended SSID

On the Extended Network page, you can change and hide the wireless network name (SSID) of the extender, as well as enable or disable the wireless network of the extender.

1. Launch a web browser, log into <http://tplinkrepeater.net>, and then go to **Settings > Wireless > Extended Network** page.
2. Either click **Copy Host SSID** or create a new one using up to 32 characters for the extended 2.4GHz network. The SSID is case-sensitive.



3. Select the **Hide SSID broadcast** checkbox if you want to hide the extender's SSID from the wireless devices. If you want to connect to the hidden SSID, please enter the SSID and the password manually.
4. Click **Save** to save the settings.

Secure the Extended Network

Change your Admin Account

1. Launch a web browser, log into <http://tplinkrepeater.net>, and then go to **Settings > System Tools > Admin Account** page.
2. Create a new username and password as shown in the figure below.



- ◆ **Old Username / Password:** Enter your current username / password.
 - ◆ **New Username / Password:** Enter your new username / password.
 - ◆ **Confirm Password:** Re-enter your new password.
3. Click **Save** to save the settings.

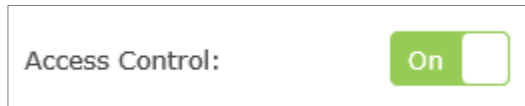
Block / Allow Network Access for Specific Clients

For increased security, you can restrict access to the extended network by allowing only specific wireless devices in the pre-set white list, or preventing the devices in the pre-set black list from connecting to the extended network.

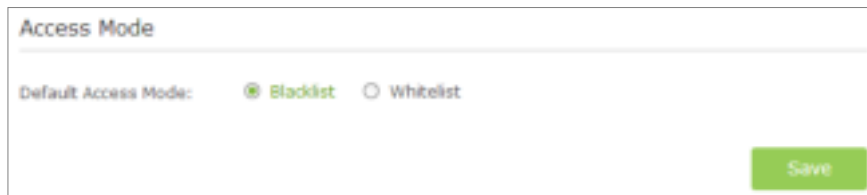
Blacklist Mode

The devices in the Blacklist are not allowed to connect to the extender.

1. Launch a web browser, log into <http://tplinkrepeater.net>, and then go to **Settings > Advanced Settings > Access Control** page.
2. Click the button to enable the Access Control function.




3. Select **Blacklist** as default access mode, then click **Save**.



4. Add the device to the blacklist by the following ways.

- Add the Online Devices to the blacklist.

In the Online Devices list, you can view the information about the devices connected to the extender. For one device, you can click the icon  to add the device to the blacklist. For several devices,

select them and click **Block** to add them at the same time.



- Add the devices that are not in the Online Devices list.

1. Launch a web browser, log into **http://tplinkrepeater.net**, and then go to **Settings > Advanced Settings > Access Control** page.
2. Click the button to enable the Access Control function.

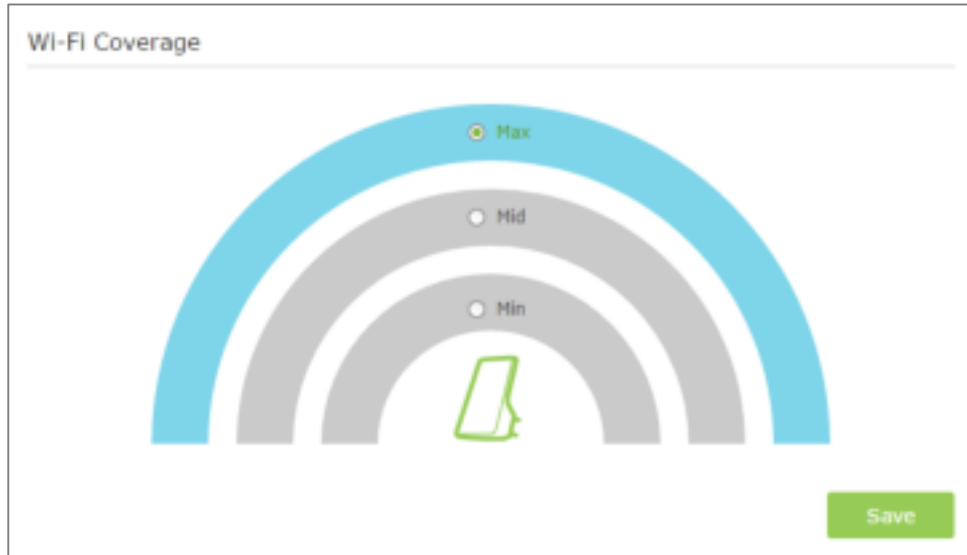

- Click the icon , and then you can modify the device name and mac address.
- Click the icon to remove one device from the list. For several devices, select them and click **Delete** to remove them at the same time.

Change Wi-Fi Coverage

Launch a web browser, log into <http://tplinkrepeater.net>, and then go to **Settings > Advanced Settings > Wi-Fi Coverage** page.

You can adjust the Wi-Fi coverage by three levels according to your need, and click **Save**.



Change the Extender's IP Address

By default, the extender is set to obtain an IP address automatically from the front router. If you want to use a specific IP address appropriate to your network demand, please refer to the steps below.



We do NOT recommend you change the IP address unless you are quite sure about the IP setting for special network demand. Random changes may lead to Internet disconnection.

1. Launch a web browser, log into <http://tplinkrepeater.net>, and then go to

Settings > Network page.

2. Select **Use the following IP address**, then enter the IP address and gateway manually.

- ◆ **IP Address:** Enter the IP address in dotted-decimal notation (192.168.0.254 by default).
- ◆ **Subnet:** Enter the subnet mask in dotted-decimal notation that determines the size of the network (255.255.255.0 by default).
- ◆ **Default Gateway:** Enter the gateway that is in the same subnet as the IP address in dotted-decimal notation. It is usually the LAN IP address of your router.

3. Click the **Save** button to save the settings.

DHCP Server

The extender can be configured as a DHCP (Dynamic Host Configuration Protocol) server to assign IP addresses automatically to the clients on the LAN.



To use the DHCP server function of the device, you should configure all computers as "Obtain an IP Address automatically" mode.

Set the DHCP Server

1. Launch a web browser, log into <http://tplinkrepeater.net>, and then go to **Settings > Network** page.
2. The DHCP server is set to be auto by default, and the function will automatically be turn on or off according to the DHCP settings of the host network.
 - If you select **on**, please configure it manually.

- ◆ **IP Address Pool:** The start address and end address must be on the same subnet with LAN IP. Your extender will assign addresses within this specified range to its clients.
- ◆ **Address Lease Time:** The amount of time in which a DHCP client can lease its current dynamic IP address assigned by your extender. After the dynamic IP address expires, a new dynamic IP address will be automatically assigned to the client.
- ◆ **Default Gateway (Optional):** Enter the LAN IP address of your host router.
- ◆ **Primary / Secondary DNS (Optional):** Enter the DNS IP address provided by your ISP.

- If you select **Off**, please make sure the DHCP server of your host network is on. Otherwise, you have to set the IP address for each client manually.
3. Click **Save** to save your changes.

DHCP Client List

The DHCP Client List displays the Client Name, MAC Address, Assigned IP and Lease Time for each DHCP Client connected to the device.

1. Launch a web browser, log into <http://tplinkrepeater.net>, and then go to **Settings > Network** page.
2. You can view the information of the DHCP clients connected to the extender in the DHCP Client List.

- ◆ **Client Name:** The name of the DHCP client.

- ◆ **MAC Address:** The MAC address of the DHCP client.
- ◆ **Assigned IP Address:** The IP address that is assigned to the client by the DHCP server.
- ◆ **Lease Time:** The time duration that the IP address is leased to the DHCP client.

Click **Refresh** to refresh the DHCP Client List.



Power Schedule

For power-saving purpose, you can power off the extender according to the pre-set time schedule by enabling this power schedule function.

1. Launch a web browser, log into <http://tplinkrepeater.net>, and then go to **Settings > Advanced Settings > Power Schedule** page.
2. Set the power-off schedule of your extender by following the below steps:



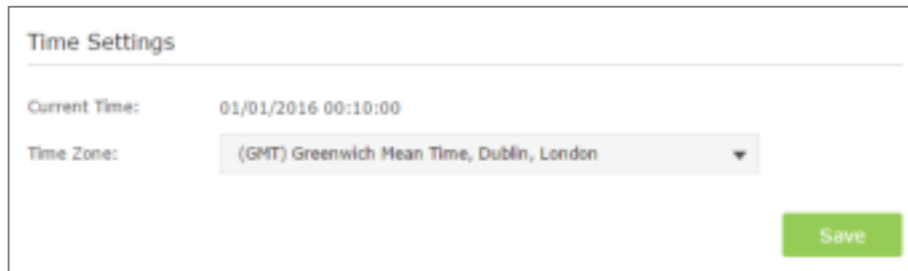

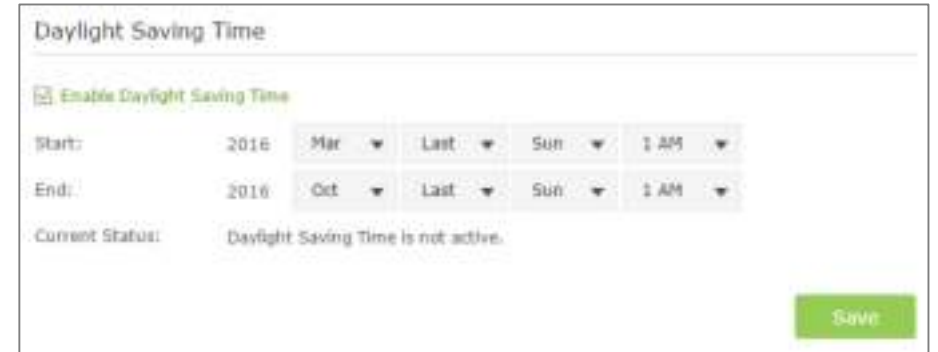

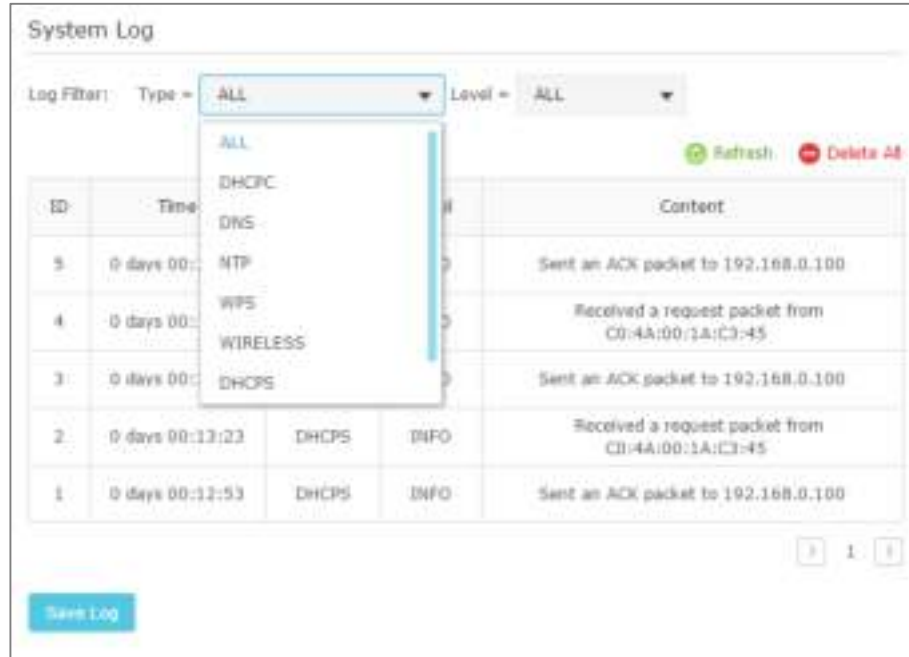

Troubleshooting

T1. How do I restore my extender to its factory default settings?

There are two ways to reset the extender:

- Option One: With the extender powered on, use a pin to press the RESET button and the LED should turn off momentarily. Then release the button.

- Option Two: Log into the extender's web management page. Go to **System Tools > Restore & Backup** page, and click **Factory Restore**.



Once the extender is reset, the current configurations will be erased and you need to reconfigure it.

T2. What can I do if I forget my login password?

1. Restore the extender to its factory default settings. If you don't know how to do that, please refer to previous **T1**.
2. Use the default username and password (admin, admin) to log into the web management page.
3. Reconfigure your extender, including the login password, by following the instructions of this guide.

T3. What can I do if I cannot access the web management page?

- Verify all the connections (either wireless or wired ones) are proper. If yes, please proceed to the next step.
- Try to obtain an IP address and gateway; if succeed, open your web-browser, and log into <http://tplinkrepeater.net>. If you are unable to log in, please RESET the device, and then use the default IP address **192.168.0.254** to log into web management page, reconfigure the device.
- Feel free to contact our technical support if the problem still persists.

T4. I enabled a wireless MAC filter, wireless access control, or access control list (ACL) on my router. What should I do before configuring and using the extender?

When a device connects through the extender to your router, the MAC address of the device shown on the router is translated to another MAC address. If your router's MAC filter, wireless access control, or ACL is enabled, the devices connected to the extender cannot get an IP address from the extender and cannot access the Internet.

To solve this problem, please follow the steps below:

1. Log into your router and disable the MAC filter, wireless access control or ACL



For more information about how to disable your router's MAC filter, wireless access control or ACL, please refer to your router's user guide.

2. Power on your extender, and using [Option ONE: Using WPS](#) or [Option TWO: Using Web Browser](#) to configure your extender.
3. Connect all of your devices to the extended network, and make sure the router's Link LED remains lit.
4. On your router, add all the Online Devices' MAC addresses to your router's MAC filter table.
5. Enable the router's MAC filter, wireless access control, or ACL.

Now, you have successfully configured your extender.

T5. How can I know that my wireless signal has been boosted by the extender?

An easy way is to compare the signal strength of your target wireless network (symbolized by its SSID), with TL-WA855RE in operation vs. out of operation. Before comparison, you'd better make sure your computer can obtain an IP address from your target wireless network and thus access the Internet.

T6. Will the extender work if I connect its ETHERNET port to the router via Ethernet cable?

Sorry, it won't work. The extender is designed to connect wirelessly to the router, while the ETHERNET port is designed to connect with a wired device, like Internet TV, Gaming console, DVR and so on.

T7. Why does the wireless transmission rate speed down, while the wireless signal is stronger after repeated by the extender?

In compliance with the wireless transmission protocol, all the extender devices are set to work in half-duplex instead of full-duplex mode. In other words, the extender has to process one-way communication between your root Wireless router (or AP) and the terminal clients; so the transmission time will be double-increased, while the speed will be decreased. TP-LINK recommends that you connect to the extender when your home network connection is poor, or when you want a larger wireless coverage to eliminate "dead zones".

Glossary

- **802.11b** - The 802.11b standard specifies a wireless networking at 11 Mbps using direct-sequence spread-spectrum (DSSS) technology and operating in the unlicensed radio spectrum at 2.4GHz, and WEP encryption for security. 802.11b networks are also referred to as Wi-Fi networks.
- **802.11g** - specification for wireless networking at 54 Mbps using direct-sequence spread-spectrum (DSSS) technology, using OFDM modulation and operating in the unlicensed radio spectrum at 2.4GHz, and backward compatibility with IEEE 802.11b devices, and WEP encryption for security.
- **802.11n** - 802.11n builds upon previous 802.11 standards by adding MIMO (multiple-input multiple-output). MIMO uses multiple transmitter and receiver antennas to allow for increased data throughput via spatial multiplexing and increased range by exploiting the spatial diversity, perhaps through coding schemes like Alamouti coding. The Enhanced Wireless Consortium (EWC) was formed to help accelerate the IEEE 802.11n development process and promote a technology specification for interoperability of next-generation wireless local area networking (WLAN) products.
- **Range Extender** - A wireless LAN transceiver or "base station" that can connect a wired LAN to one or many wireless devices. Access points can also bridge to each other.
- **Domain Name System** - An Internet Service that translates the names of websites into IP addresses.
- **Domain Name** - A descriptive name for an address or group of addresses on the Internet.
- **ISP (Internet Service Provider)** - A company that provides access to the Internet.
- **MTU (Maximum Transmission Unit)** - The size in bytes of the largest packet that can be transmitted.
- **SSID** - A Service Set Identification is a thirty-two character (maximum) alphanumeric key identifying a wireless local area network. For the wireless

devices in a network to communicate with each other, all devices must be configured with the same SSID. This is typically the configuration parameter for a wireless PC card. It corresponds to the ESSID in the wireless Access Point and to the wireless network name.

- **WEP (Wired Equivalent Privacy)** - A data privacy mechanism based on a 64-bit or 128-bit or 152-bit shared key algorithm, as described in the IEEE 802.11 standard.
- **Wi-Fi** - A trademark of the Wi-Fi Alliance and the brand name for products using the IEEE 802.11 family of standards.
- **WLAN (Wireless Local Area Network)** - A group of computers and associated devices communicate with each other wirelessly, which network serving users are limited in a local area.
- **WPA (Wi-Fi Protected Access)** - WPA is a security technology for wireless networks that improves on the authentication and encryption features of WEP (Wired Equivalent Privacy). In fact, WPA was developed by the networking industry in response to the shortcomings of WEP. One of the key technologies behind WPA is the Temporal Key Integrity Protocol (TKIP). TKIP addresses the encryption weaknesses of WEP. Another key component of WPA is built-in authentication that WEP does not offer. With this feature, WPA provides roughly comparable security to VPN tunneling with WEP, with the benefit of easier administration and use. This is similar to 802.1x support and requires a RADIUS server in order to implement. The Wi-Fi Alliance will call this, WPA-Enterprise. One variation of WPA is called WPA Pre Shared Key or WPA-Personal for short - this provides an authentication alternative to an expensive RADIUS server. WPA-Personal is a simplified but still powerful form of WPA most suitable for home Wi-Fi networking. To use WPA-Personal, a person sets a static key or "passphrase" as with WEP. But, using TKIP, WPA-Personal automatically changes the keys at a preset time interval, making it much more difficult for hackers to find and exploit them. The Wi-Fi Alliance will call this, WPA-Personal.
